His efforts go way beyond the mole work mentioned above. Darrin Hanson has been the park's official lawn mower since last year. His cutting-edge technique keeps the grass looking good. The editor would also like to commend Bill Roenicke for his ongoing role of Unofficial Park Caretaker. Bill oversees the park's maintenance and improvements and reports on the park's status at meetings of the Steering Committee.

Clean-up event

On September 15 we conducted a clean-up of the sidewalk corridor that runs between Lake Youngs Way and Index Avenue. Nine persons showed up to remove or trim weedy bushes, cut berry vines, pull weeds and grass, trim some overhead branches, gather trash, and sweep/blow the sidewalk when all was done. Work started at 10 a.m. and lasted until 11:30. The overcast sky threatened to rain but never followed through. Loppers, rakes, and brooms got a

good workout. Gloves were valuable for handling berry vines. Refreshments were provided.

The work was done by Reid Heimbeck (transported yard waste bins bins on a trailer), Pam Carino, Marina Higgins (brought refreshments), Larry Gorg, Dave Beedon, Darrin Hanson (provided a leaf blower), Ken Schug (provided a truck for hauling the waste to a recycling facility), Jodi Collins (walked a recycling bin down the street), and Dennis Anderson. Thanks to all who participated! The event was a success.

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Housing Development

("Allura at Tiffany Park")
Status as of early December, 2018:

- 1. Streets and sidewalks are complete.
- 2. Street signs have been installed. Street names are SE 18th Street, SE 19th Way, and Olympic Court SE.
- 3. All lots have been seeded with grass and appear to be ready for construction of houses.
- 4. Locked mailboxes for all lots have been installed in one spot near the high point of the site (near the southeast end).
- 5. Wood rail fences surround undeveloped areas.
- 6. The entrance on 124th Place SE is complete. At the site boundary the street name changes to Olympic Court SE.
- 7. One house (probably a model home) is under construction near the site entrance on SE 18th Street.
- 8. A permanent "ALLURA" sign has been installed near the house.

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Red-light Camera

There has been some confusion and ill feeling about the operation of the traffic enforcement camera installed at the intersection of Puget Drive and Talbot Road. Some people fear that tickets are being issued for the wrong reason or that the rules governing right turns on a red light have changed. Nothing has changed---it always has been the law that one may turn right on a red light *only after coming to a complete stop*. This is the case whether or not an intersection is monitored by a camera. A traffic cop can cite a driver for the same thing. The camera is merely taking the place of a traffic cop.

If you want to avoid getting a ticket for turning right on red at the aforementioned intersection (or any intersection), come to a complete stop first, then turn right when safe to do so. Sensors embedded in the pavement can determine when a vehicle has stopped. Tickets are issued if a vehicle rolls through an intersection without stopping, even if the roll is done slowly.

Membership

As mentioned on page 1 under "Help!," our association Neighbors, have you considered becoming involved with the Tiffany Park Neighborhood Association? The continued maintenance and improvement of our neighborhood is dependent on neighbors like you to offer ideas, help with events, and provide occasional muscle power. The more volunteers we have to get things done, the smaller everyone's contribution can be.

At the present, most neighborhood business and maintenance is handled by a handful of people consisting of members of the Steering Committee and a few other dedicated individuals. It is challenging to get the needed work done with so few participating. We encourage you to consider

helping out, even if it is limited to providing ideas for improving the way we get things done. We can all benefit from the perspective of new participants.

To be (a TPNA supporting member) or not to be, that is the question. The answer is "be a supporting member!"

Dues

Another way to help the neighborhood is to pay voluntary annual dues (cost stated below). This makes you a supporting member. The dues go into our bank account, from which we pay for supplies and equipment related to the staging of events such as out picnic and maintenance of Ginger Creek Park. Being a supporting member entitles you to vote at the annual meeting of the general membership, whether the voting concerns selection of new officers for the Steering Committee or changes to our bylaws.

The annual cost for being a supporting member is \$12.00 per person for those under 65 and \$6.00 per person for those who are 65 or older. Note that it is per person, not per household. Membership is dirt cheap! At the end of this newsletter is a membership form. The form can also be downloaded or printed from the TPNA website (www.tiffany-park.org).

If you shop at McLendon Hardware, your dues will be quickly paid for by the discount the store gives to members---there is a 10% discount on most nonsale items. If you're a frequent shopper there, your dues will be paid back more than once in the year. When you pay TPNA dues, we inform McLendon's of your membership. Then at the cash register you say that you're a member of the TPNA and give

your name. The discounts then start rolling in---it's almost as good as winning the lottery.

Whether you prefer to be a general member (by virtue of living in the neighborhood) or a supporting member (by virtue of paying dues), we welcome your participation. Why not attend a meeting of the Steering Committee to see what's going on and get an idea about how you can contribute? Anyone can attend. Meetings are held every other month at the home of a Steering Committee member. Information about meetings is posted in advance on the TPNA website under Announcements. To find out where the meeting takes place, call the Association's president: contact information is in the article about the Steering Committee.

The greater our membership, the more influence our neighborhood will have if an issue needs to be addressed before the city government. Please join us!

Code Compliance

The City of Renton's code compliance department is devoted to ensuring that things are built and maintained "according to code." Compliance with Renton's building codes contributes to clean, attractive, and safe neighborhoods and helps maintain property values.

The City has a process for dealing with code violations: an inspector contacts the property owner in writing, asking that the violation be corrected

within an appropriate time frame. The property owner's response determines the subsequent steps.

The TPNA Steering Committee encourages property owners to become educated about code compliance. The City's website has detailed information at http://rentonwa.gov/living/default.aspx?id=200.

Becoming a supporting member in the TPNA is easy---just fill out an application (at end of this newsletter) and give it and the appropriate amount of American dollars (cash or check) to our treasurer. The articles "Membership" and "Dues" have more info.

NextDoor.com

Nextdoor.com is a website that acts like a bulletin board for a neighborhood and enables members to reply to messages posted there. Messages typically do one of the following:

- 1. Announce events
- 2. Sell things or give things away
- 3. Report lost or found pets
- 4. Say "I'm looking for X. Does anyone have one?"
- 5. Ask if anyone knows a good service provider (landscaper, house cleaner, carpenter, etc.) or recommend a good one
- 6. Report crime
- 7. Discuss safety topics
- 8. Ask for advice.

The Tiffany Park neighborhood has a "page" on Nextdoor.com. On that page a resident who has registered with the site can see all the announcements posted by fellow neighbors, reply to anyone's announcement, and post an announcement for others to see.

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NextDoor.com (continued)

All residents within the Tiffany Park neighborhood are encouraged to join. The only information you must provide is street address and e-mail address. Your street address is what enables you to see the postings made by fellow neighbors. providing an e-mail address enables you to receive e-mail notifications of postings by other residents. This is a secure site and no information is sold or passed on to other parties. There are unobtrusive ads displayed with the recent postings but they do not get in the way of viewing announcements.

A page on the TPNA website has links to more information. To get to that page, go to the TPNA website (www.tiffany-park.org). From the home page go to "Communication...Newsletter, Nextdoor.com, and Yahoo group. "


